Hello and Welcome,

Today's program is a celebration of the German Baroque through a selection of gorgeous, *a cappella* choral works. The singers of BCE and I have enjoyed preparing every note of this program: the music just wants to be sung! From the brilliantly crafted measures of Schütz to the Bachinspired warmth of Distler, every note in today's concert is part of a beloved, centuries-old tradition of choral music in Germany.

As you listen to the music and the various introductions the singer share with you, try to imagine yourself in, say, Leipzig's Tomaskirche where Walter, Bach, and many others played the organ and led the choirs. Imagine the smell of the freshly-cut greens and the warm, yellow light of the candles. This is the season and this is the music!

In the first half, I hope you especially enjoy Distler's choral work from his *Weihnachtsgeschichte*. This seven movement set of choral variations demonstrates Distler keen knowledge of Bach's part-writing as well as a personal sense of vocal writing and tonality that mark this as a unique piece in the repertoire.

In the second half, enjoy the motets of Heinrich Schütz. Easily the greatest German composer before Bach, Schütz was able to infuse his music with so much meaning. Not only does the text present clearly, but his music somehow goes even further to strengthen the meaning. Take special note of his inventive use of six voices; throughout all of today's motets, Schütz finds ways to create new, fresh sounds by using various permutations of voicing.

Finally, I love the joy and exuberance of the many carol settings from across the centuries. The beloved tunes—some new to you and some old—have the Christmas spirit of centuries between each note!

I hope you enjoy today's concert—we have certainly loved every minute of learning these masterworks. May you have a safe and happy holiday.
